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in this provocative and original exploration of racial subjugation during slavery and its aftermath saidiya hartman illumines the forms of terror and resistance that shaped black identity scenes of subjection examines the forms of domination that usually go undetected in particular the encroachments of power that take place through notions of humanity enjoyment protection rights and consent by looking at slave narratives

plantation diaries popular theater slave performance freedmen s primers and legal cases hartman investigates a wide variety of scenes ranging from the auction block and minstrel show to the staging of the self possessed and rights bearing individual of freedom while attentive to the performance of power the terrible spectacles of slaveholders dominion and the innocent amusements designed to abase and pacify the enslaved and the entanglements of pleasure and terror in these displays of mastery hartman also examines the possibilities for resistance redress and transformation embodied in black performance and everyday practice this important study contends that despite the legal abolition of slavery emergent notions of individual will and responsibility revealed the tragic continuities between slavery and freedom bold and persuasively argued scenes of subjection will engage readers in a broad range of historical literary and cultural studies

in this new second edition of the power of feminist theory domination resistance solidarity amy allen diagnoses the inadequacies of previous feminist conceptions of power and draws on the work of a diverse group of theorists of power including michel foucault judith butler bell hooks and hannah arendt in order to construct a new feminist conception of power the conception of power developed in this book enables readers to theorize domination resistance and solidarity and perhaps more importantly to do so in a way that illuminates the interrelatedness of these three modalities of power the new edition of this foundational text includes substantial new material on intersectionality and power transnational feminism and power in relation to homonationalism and neo imperialism and empowerment feminism it addresses important criticisms of foucault arendt and butler that have been raised by black feminists critical philosophers of race postcolonial theorists and marxists the power of feminist theory domination resistance solidarity is an essential text for students engaging with feminist analyses of power feminist theory and feminist political thought

incorporate essential historical contemporary and literary perspectives on black cultural criticism to explore the full portrait of racial injustice and inequality in america taking up such topics as the evolving politics of new orleans before and after hurricane katrina and novels by toni morrison and colson whitehead this book engages with the black radical tradition afropessimism antiblackness race reductionism and other key theories and concepts in contemporary black studies challenging the prevailing assertion that longstanding white animus against nonwhite peoples sufficiently and adequately explains deepening injustice past injustice or present inequality the essays argue that such thinking fails to fully explain america s past and leaves us ill equipped to handle the continuing challenges in the present tracing black cultural criticism across the 19th 20th and 21st centuries this book will appeal to students scholars and researchers of black studies race and ethnic studies and contemporary and black american literature

in death s futurity sampada aranke examines the importance of representations of death to black liberation aranke analyzes posters photographs journalism and films that focus on the murders of black panther party members lil bobby hutton fred hampton and george jackson to construct a visual history of the 1960s and 1970s black power era she shows how black radicals used these murders to engage in political action that imagined black futurity from the position of death photographs of hutton that appeared on flyers and posters called attention to the condition of his death while the 1971 documentary the murder of fred hampton enabled the consideration of hampton s afterlife through visual meditations on his murder printmaking and political posters surrounding jackson s murder marked the transition from black power to the prison abolition movement in ways that highlighted the relationship between surveillance policing incarceration and anti black violence by foregrounding the photographed collaged filmed and drawn black body aranke demonstrates that corporeality and corpses are crucial to the efforts to shape visions of a black future free from white supremacy

democracy and empire theorizes the material basis of popular sovereignty via the black radical tradition popular sovereignty contains an affective attachment to wealth secured through collective agreements to dominate others i e self and other determination inés valdez expands on racial capitalism by theorizing its anglo european based popular politics which authorize capital accumulation enabled by empire and legitimated by racial ideologies this stunts political projects in the global south valdez masterfully outlines how social reproduction is provided by racialized others who sacrifice families and communities and how the political alienation from nature in wealthy polities is mediated by technology and enabled by a joint devaluation of nature and manual labor performed by racialized others the book concludes with a theorization of anti imperial popular sovereignty based on political relations that encompass nature this title is part of the flip it open programme and may also be available open access check our website cambridge core for details

a dramatic and necessary rethinking of the meaning of democracy democratic anarchy

grapples with an uncomfortable but obvious truth inimical to democracy both aesthetics and politics depend on the structuring antagonism of inclusion and exclusion yet in democratic anarchy matthew scully asks how can the people be represented in a way that acknowledges what remains unrepresentable what would it mean to face up to the constitutive exclusions that haunt u s democracy and its anxious fantasies of equality synthesizing a broad range of theoretical traditions and interlocutors including lacan rancière edelman and hartman democratic anarchy polemically declares that there has never been nor can there ever be a realized democracy in the u s because democracy always depends on the hierarchical institution of a formal order by one part of the population over another engaging with an expansive corpus of american literature and art harriet jacobs nathaniel hawthorne louis zukofsky thomas pynchon toni morrison theresa hak kyung cha nari ward ocean vuong and safiya sinclair democratic anarchy argues that many liberal concepts and institutions are in fact structurally opposed to democratic equality because they depend on regulating what can appear and in what form by focusing on works that disrupt this regulatory impulse scully shows how rhetorical strategies of interruption excess and disorder figure the anarchic equality that inegalitarian fantasies of democracy disavow democratic anarchy develops a rigorous theory of equality that refuses to repeat the inequalities against which it positions itself and it does so by turning to moments of resistance both aesthetic and political inaugurated by the equality that inheres in and antagonizes the order of things

tying together legal historical social political and literary strands to show how the law itself was implicated in the persistence of slavery this work sheds new light on slavery and southern history as it probes the conscience of a troubled jurist incapable of fully transcending his times
